A life saved against all odds

Six years after his dad's passing, Li Chen stood in a Toronto emergency department looking at his unconscious mother, who had been resuscitated and placed on a ventilator after her heart and breathing stopped. He was terrified seeing his mom, Xiu Feng Gu, this way.

At 71 years old, she had been healthy and living on her own. She loved walking for hours at a time and cooking family meals for Li, his wife and their son.

Before Xiu Feng's eventual transfer to Michael Garron Hospital, doctors discovered that an extensive bacterial infection in her neck and chest had sent her body into septic shock and caused cardiac arrest. Over 15 days, they administered antibiotics and operated five times in efforts to clear the infection. But nothing was working.

With Xiu Feng's odds of survival at just 30%, her doctors reached out to Dr. Tony Eskander, a Head and Neck Surgeon at Michael Garron Hospital, asking if there was anything he and his colleagues in thoracic surgery could do to save her life.

"We were well-positioned to care for Xiu Feng given the high volume of intricate head, neck and chest surgeries we perform and strong collaboration among our surgeons," says Dr. Eskander. "Our Intensive Care Unit (ICU) also has specific expertise in caring for patients recovering from these major surgeries."

Shortly after Xiu Feng was transferred to Michael Garron Hospital, Dr. Eskander and Thoracic Surgeon Dr. Sayf Gazala began a five-hour overnight surgery. During the highly complex procedure they meticulously removed bacteria from her neck and chest, as well as fluid from around her heart.

One week later, and about a month after Xiu Feng had lost consciousness, she was weaned from her sedation. Li recalls being brought to tears when he had a video call with her minutes after she awoke. "She was awake and smiling. I was so happy."

After being released from the ICU, Xiu Feng spent two more months in our hospital. A multidisciplinary team helped her regain her physical strength, her ability to perform essential daily activities and her capacity to breathe without medical assistance.

Today, Xiu Feng lives with Li and his family, and is nearly back to her usual self. She is again enjoying



hour-long walks and bringing everyone around the dinner table for her delicious meals.

With Li translating, Xiu Feng says she is immensely grateful for the life-saving care she received at Michael Garron Hospital. No matter how much help she requested while recovering, she adds, staff always responded quickly and with kindness.

"I felt like I was treated like a family member," she says with a smile.





Bringing vaccines to hard-hit neighbourhoods

Vaccines are our best protection against COVID-19. To get doses in arms throughout East Toronto as quickly as possible, Michael Garron Hospital led a strategy that prioritized communities with high rates of COVID-19.

"We learned early on that we had to be nimble and be flexible, and that we had to consider the needs of our community so no eligible individual was left behind," says Dr. Jeff Powis, Medical Director of Infection Prevention and Control at Michael Garron Hospital.

Collaborative community partnerships were essential to delivering vaccines in neighbourhoods with large populations of essential workers and multigenerational families in high-density buildings, where the virus could spread rapidly.

"It's been amazing working with Michael Garron Hospital," says Munira Khilji, Coordinator of the school-based paediatric clinic at Health Access Thorncliffe Park. "They're just ready to do whatever is necessary."

Munira helped organize online forums connecting Thorncliffe Park families with hospital representatives, family doctors and school administrators who could answer their COVID-19 questions. By providing translation services and covering culturally relevant topics, such as vaccination during Ramadan, the forums became a trusted information source.

Our strategy used many different tactics to get the word out. In the Thorncliffe Park, Oakridge, Taylor-Massey and Flemingdon Park neighbourhoods, more than 70 community ambassadors went door-to-door to speak with their neighbours about the importance of vaccines. Information was also shared through communityled initiatives like a moderated WhatsApp group. And when people were ready to get their shots, they found "pop-up" vaccine clinics in community centres, schools, parks, mosques, grocery stores and subway stations.

"This is our way to demonstrate that we're here for our community, for East Toronto," Dr. Powis says. "There were times during this vaccine rollout that were challenging and very difficult. But we've kept our vision and principles in mind and, as a team, we've been able to continuously push forward."

Providing COVID-19 treatments to people who need them most

"I have an autoimmune disease that attacked my lungs. If I were to get COVID-19, I would expect to be rushed to hospital," says Craig Darlington. But when Craig did get infected, Michael Garron Hospital connected him with treatment that helped him recover quickly at home.

"If you are immunocompromised or have other risk factors and you have COVID-19 symptoms, it's important to consult a health professional to see if you are eligible for the treatments. These drugs are very effective when they are given early," says Dr. Janine McCready, Infectious Diseases Physician at Michael Garron Hospital.

After a COVID-19 exposure in February 2022, Craig had a PCR test at our Clinical Assessment Centre. Dr. McCready personally informed him of his positive result.

"Because I was immunocompromised and I tested positive, she was trying to get me in for treatment as soon as possible," says Craig. "I told Dr. McCready I don't care what it takes, I will move heaven and earth to be there on time."

Just two days after his test, Craig received a drug called Sotrovimab that was given intravenously over about two hours. "They just put the IV on you and monitor you while you sit back and relax," Craig says.

He went home afterward and his COVID-19 symptoms improved.

For Tyler Almond, catching the virus at the outset of the pandemic left him with a form of "long COVID," which caused chronic fatigue, poor blood circulation and nerve damage. So when Tyler tested positive again in March 2022, his family doctor prescribed Paxlovid – a drug that was so new Tyler had trouble filling the prescription. He called pharmacies and clinics throughout the city; Michael Garron Hospital offered the earliest appointment.

During his treatment, Tyler experienced harsh side effects and contacted our Clinical Assessment Centre for advice. He then recovered quickly from his second COVID-19 infection – and is full of praise for the attentive care he received.

"I contacted the clinic on a Sunday morning and I got a call from the doctor in half an hour," says Tyler. "I've seen every doctor you can think of over the last two years and I never had anyone provide support like that."

Emergency care built for our community

Caring for over 84,000 patients annually, our Stavro Emergency Department serves a diverse population with wide-ranging health needs – from broken bones to mental illness, and everything in between. Improving patient experiences and medical outcomes is a constant focus for our emergency team.

That focus helped give rise to our Child and Youth Emergency Zone in October 2021. Designed with input from local families, the zone features a separate entrance, waiting area and exam rooms, as well as colourful murals, child-appropriate television, books, toys and other activities to comfort young patients.

Just as importantly, the zone's doctors, nurses and child life specialists are especially skilled in helping children and families cope, providing emotional support and easy-to-understand medical information.

"We know our community is home to more children than the Toronto average, and that emergency departments can be intimidating for young patients," says Dr. Kyle Vojdani, Chief and Medical Director of our Stavro Emergency Department. "Our Child and Youth Emergency Zone aims to improve their experience by providing a safe and welcoming area for paediatric assessment and treatment."

More than 5,700 children and youth were treated in the zone within five months of its opening. It has reduced the amount of time patients wait to see a doctor and their length of stay in emergency. Meeting the specific care needs of our patients also motivated the creation of a Mental Health Emergency Assessment Zone in September 2020. Here, a team that includes mental health nurses cares for people experiencing acute mental health and addiction-related issues.

Before the pandemic, the proportion of people in our community seeking mental healthcare was higher than the city average. And between 2019 and 2021, we saw the number of patients requiring mental health assessments in our Stavro Emergency Department jump by 40%.

Our Mental Health Emergency Assessment Zone provides an environment that is both secure and calming, with subdued lighting and lower noise levels. Additionally, its Scotiabank Lounge offers a comfortable area where patients can wait with their loved ones.

Yet another improvement to our emergency services came with the March 2021 launch of our Virtual Emergency Department. Established to boost access to urgent care for non-life-threatening issues, virtual appointments connect patients and emergency doctors by video. A doctor provides timely treatment and guidance, and if necessary, explains why the patient should visit an emergency department for further assessment.

"Whether we're in-person or virtual, we provide East Torontonians with the care they need, when they need it," says Dr. Vojdani.

Family-friendly emergency care, close to home





One evening, four-year-old Dillon Travis came down with what her parents, Kate and Ryan, thought was a case of food poisoning. After a good night's sleep, Dillon was largely back to her usual outgoing, precocious self. But in the days that followed, her vomiting came and went, accompanied by fatigue, and it became clear she required urgent care.

"Dillon just didn't look right in her eyes, so we quickly decided to bring her to emergency," says Kate, who took Dillon while Ryan stayed home with their younger child, Mackenna.

Following triage, Dillon and Kate were taken to the Child and Youth Emergency Zone, where Dillon was set up with a tablet in a bed that was surrounded by colourful artwork. "Right away, Dillon was in a space where she felt comfortable," says Kate.

Dillon was soon introduced to Morgan Livingstone, a Child Life Specialist who supports children throughout the hospital. Morgan was present for all the tests and procedures Dillon required. She explained what was happening in simple terms, provided positive distractions for Dillon and ensured Kate was coping. "She took everything off my plate so that I could just focus on supporting my child."

The situation became critical when emergency staff discovered Dillon's blood sugar level was

dangerously low, running the risk of seizures and loss of consciousness. Staff worked to raise it as fast as possible. They connected Dillon to an intravenous line, took a blood sample and repeatedly tested her blood sugar level to ensure it was rising.

Kate was impressed by the efforts of the large team caring for her daughter. "The situation had all the ingredients to be very traumatic for Dillon, but it was the opposite. It was incredible to watch."

Dillon, along with Kate, spent the night in our hospital's Paediatric Inpatient Unit for further monitoring. "She was treated like a queen," Kate says, noting that Dillon was able to choose her own pillowcase and keep a giant stuffed tiger that Morgan had given her.

Thankfully, her low blood sugar was caused by a manageable condition she will likely outgrow. Meanwhile, Kate says Dillon "still asks when she will get to go back to the hospital!"

Cardiac service introduced to address community need

This year, our cardiac program began offering a procedure that provides specialized care to patients, sooner and closer to home. A percutaneous coronary intervention (PCI) helps to improve cardiovascular health, something especially important given East Toronto's high prevalence of cardiovascular disease.

PCI is a non-surgical technique that places a stent – a tiny tube – into a blocked blood vessel. By improving blood flow, it reduces chest pain (angina) and can prevent heart attacks.

Asghar Ali received a PCI here, and it saved him from a heart attack. When he had severe chest pains, Asghar came straight to Michael Garron Hospital. He was expertly assessed in the Stavro Emergency Department by the cardiologist on call, Dr. Raj Naidu, and sent urgently to the cardiac catheterization lab. There, the blockage in Asghar's heart was fixed with a PCI performed by Dr. Mohammad Zia, Chief of Cardiology and Director of Cardiac Services, and his team.

Following his procedure, Asghar stayed in hospital overnight and was home with his wife and four children the next day.

"I really appreciate all of the nurses and doctors who took care of me," says Asghar. "They are doing an excellent job and I really appreciate the effort."

Previously, Asghar would have been transferred to another hospital for a PCI – adding delay and stress to his experience. Fortunately a partnership between our hospital and Sunnybrook Health Sciences Centre brought the expertise in-house as of July 2021.

"Offering the PCI service at Michael Garron Hospital means we can respond to a significant need for cardiac care in our community. A large proportion of community members in our catchment area are South Asian, a demographic that is up to four times more likely to have heart disease due to genetics," says Dr. Zia.

Only lower-risk PCIs were performed at our hospital when the service was introduced. The scope has since expanded as our PCI program evolved to incorporate advanced techniques so that more complex cases can be addressed here, allowing us to serve a broader community, says Dr. Zia.

EQUIPPED FOR SUCCESS

Donors fund state-of-the-art equipment that is essential to delivering life-changing care throughout Michael Garron Hospital. Here are some of the items purchased by donor dollars during the last fiscal year:

Labour/birthing bed

Each year we welcome thousands of babies into the world at our Family Birthing Centre.
Comfortable and versatile beds are important to patients and staff alike.

Two incubators

In our Special Care Nursery, incubators regulate temperature, oxygen, humidity and noise levels to support premature and ill newborns.

Three ultrasound machines

These ultrasound machines give our anaesthesiologists a clear view of blood vessels and nerves so they can deliver local anaesthesia with extreme precision during surgery, enabling patients to recover more quickly.

Four electrosurgical generators

Generators are fundamental tools used by our surgeons in a wide range of operations. They generate electrical currents that surgeons use to quickly cut soft tissue and control bleeding.

ENT surgical microscope

To support intricate procedures, our surgical microscope offers otolaryngology surgeons a bright and fully focused view of the deep and narrow cavities of the ears, nose and throat.

Video bronchoscope

Used in our Intensive Care Unit to diagnose and treat lung conditions in critically ill patients, the bronchoscope's large video screen also allows staff to supervise and teach medical residents and fellows in real time.

Championing patientoriented research

By engaging patients, families and care providers in everything from designing studies to sharing research findings, patient-oriented research fosters practical innovations that make healthcare safer and more effective.

Our focus in this area was bolstered by the September 2021 appointment of Dr. Kelly Smith, PhD, as the inaugural Michael Garron Chair in Patient Oriented Research. This position was established thanks to the extraordinary generosity of Berna and Myron Garron.

Dr. Smith is conducting and supporting patient-oriented research aligned with our vision of creating health and building community. For patients and researchers, such research can be "a powerful and rewarding experience resulting in important changes to improve healthcare," says Dr. Smith, who is also an Associate Professor at the University of Toronto's Institute of Health Policy, Management and Evaluation.

She is partnering with East Toronto health and social service organizations, as well as community members who have experienced mental illness, to uncover barriers to accessing mental health services for adults. "Together we'll design sustainable solutions and test how well they work in the real world," she says.



Dr. Smith is also collaborating with patients, families and hospital colleagues to identify and prioritize potential research projects, with plans to initiate some of them in late 2022.

This appointment has increased our hospital's capacity for patient-oriented research, and Dr. Smith hopes to build the program over the next year by adding essential research personnel and securing research grants.





MORE ABOUT RESEARCH AT MICHAEL GARRON HOSPITAL

With 70 studies underway as of March 2022, our hospital's research falls into two broad categories:

- Clinical research typically involves patients, with the goal of advancing diagnostic methods or treatments. For instance, Dr. Chris Kandel, Infectious Diseases Physician, is leading a clinical trial to evaluate interferon lambda, an antiviral protein, as a treatment for hospitalized COVID-19 patients one of several COVID-19 studies at our hospital.
- Health services research aims to improve healthcare systems by examining how social factors, organizational processes, technology and other elements affect both access and quality of care. An example is a study, led by psychiatrist Dr. Gili Adler Nevo, assessing the effectiveness of a cognitive behavioural therapy-based app for treating adolescents with anxiety disorders.

Stepping up to make a difference

When Dr. Sheila Laredo joined Michael Garron Hospital as Chief of Staff in January 2022, she noted a unique approach to safety and quality that's hardwired into our processes. For instance, a daily safety check involving all hospital department heads builds shared awareness of potential concerns.

"It creates that open communication, which is very useful for creating a safer environment and a safer space for people to take proactive steps to make things better," says Dr. Laredo, who is responsible for leading safety and risk management initiatives.

Pitching in is embedded in our hospital culture, Dr. Laredo found. "Nobody is dialing it in. People support each other a lot."

That willingness to help became crucial during the pandemic. "People stepped up to do what needed to be done," says Dr. Laredo. "You had surgeons doing vaccinations. 'That's not my job' doesn't seem to be part of the vocabulary."

Our hospital's proactive community advocacy was what attracted Dr. Laredo to work here.

"I care very deeply about equity, social justice and evidence-based public policy decisions," she says. Our innovative COVID-19 testing and vaccination programs "really spoke to looking at the evidence and saying 'where is the inequity?' and 'what can this hospital do to address it?'"



As part of her role, Dr. Laredo oversees the hospital's physicians. Her priority is encouraging people to grow from their areas of strength. "I really want to support and empower them to be the leaders that they want and need to be."

She proudly made a financial commitment to building the hospital's excellence, with a donation to the Heart of the East Campaign.

"To be part of a community, you have to commit to it," she says about her gift. "It's all part of that same commitment, to say 'this matters to me."

Exemplary standinghas us glowing

Michael Garron Hospital earned "Exemplary Standing" after a rigorous, organization-wide review by Accreditation Canada, a group that aims to improve health outcomes through independent assessments based on global standards of excellence. That's the highest possible achievement – and a truly remarkable result during a pandemic.

"This would not have been possible without the hard work of every team member," says Sarah Downey, President and CEO of Michael Garron Hospital. "It is validation that we are truly better together, every day."

"Glowing hearts" are displayed in several hospital departments as a reminder of our strength as we continue to provide high-quality care in extremely challenging circumstances.



Supporting lifelong learning

As a community teaching hospital, Michael Garron Hospital invests in our people by providing opportunities for continuing education. One way we do this is through our Tuition Assistance Program, which partially reimburses tuition for career-related courses that lead to a degree, diploma or certification through accredited organizations.

We were able to double the staff tuition reimbursement amount in April 2022 thanks to an exceptional \$1.5 million donation from Dr. Molly Rundle and Stephen Lister toward the program and our hospital's redevelopment.

Among the many staff who received tuition assistance, Jhoanna Manlapas, Registered Practical Nurse, took courses in pursuit of her goal to become a Registered Nurse. "These courses have taught me valuable skills and knowledge that I've been able to implement in my work at the hospital," says Jhoanna. "This has been a wonderful benefit for me and my patients, especially during the pandemic."

Molly and Stephen have long-standing connections with our hospital and community. Molly spent 30 years serving East Toronto as a family physician. Stephen, once a patient here, was a valued member of Michael Garron Hospital Foundation's Board of Directors for nearly 10 years.

The couple's shared passion for learning was instrumental in their decision to support our Tuition Assistance Program. "I think the hospital is its people – what better way to give back than through the program." says Molly.

"We hope this gift allows staff to further areas of competence that are important to them and to patient care," adds Stephen.

We've partnered with community leaders to learn from their lived experiences and deepen our understanding of crucial issues. Additionally, we are fostering safe spaces for sharing and raising awareness.

This year:

- Michael Garron Hospital began offering Aboriginal Elder Services to inpatients from First Nations, Inuit and Métis communities. These services complement care plans with the inclusion of traditional medicines, ceremonies and culturally appropriate support.
- Throughout Black History Month, we amplified the voices and stories of Black staff and physicians on our websites and social media pages. We also encouraged participation in a variety of events, ranging from educational webinars to film screenings and art exhibits celebrating Black culture.
- We held numerous ceremonies at the Bear's Den All Nations Traditional Medicine Sweat Lodge on our campus. Among them, a commemoration of the first 215 unmarked graves discovered at a British Columbia residential school, and a remembrance honouring First Nations, Inuit and Métis peoples affected by COVID-19. We also marked the first National Day for Truth and Reconciliation.

Internally, we presented a series of workshops to expose the damaging impact of discrimination, racism and exclusion, while highlighting the importance of inclusive leadership. Additionally, our Emerging Leaders Program, which focuses on developing talent, widened its scope by supporting self-nominations and introducing a voluntary demographic survey to enhance the selection process.

While we continue to learn more about the people we work with and for, one thing is certain: there is no room for racism at Michael Garron Hospital. As a team, we are committed to doing better and reaching further to ensure a culturally sensitive and inclusive environment for our patients and colleagues alike. Together, we're paving the way for future healthcare leaders who reflect and respect the diversity of the vibrant community we serve.

Welcoming back our volunteers

Ann was able to fill the gap somewhat by helping her good friend and neighbour, volunteer Helen McBrien, assemble COVID-19 take-home test kits that were then distributed by our hospital throughout East Toronto.

Gearing up for the big move

Preparations to move into the Ken and Marilyn Thomson Patient Care Centre kicked into high gear this year.

The plans for moving patients and staff to the new facility are complex, says Dr. Carmine Simone, Vice President, Medical at Michael Garron Hospital. "We've got to get the patients in there safely, and want to ensure nothing goes awry during transportation. We need enough staff in the new facility and enough staff staying with the remaining patients to deliver safe care in both locations. We will literally be running two hospitals from the time we get the keys to when the move is complete."

While a dedicated team manages the project and supports our safe transition to the Thomson Centre, every department in the hospital is involved in planning the move as well as how we will deliver care in the new facility.

"It's new space, new rooms and new technology. That all equates to us doing things that we never did before, and things we've always done but in a very new way," says Dr. Simone.

Staff are learning how they'll need to work differently in the new facility, redesigning workflows and poring over details such as how they deliver meals, stock medication carts and respond to emergency codes. "It takes a lot of deconstructing

to make sure we know all the steps of each task," says Dr. Simone. "Then we have to train people to be experts so they can pass the learning on to other team members."


Planning continued even as staff redeployed to COVID-19 patient care and vaccination efforts. Still, despite the pandemic, we're on track to move into the Thomson Centre this winter.

Kim Kurschinski, Supervisor, Inpatient Mental Health and Crisis Team, is excited by how the Thomson Centre will improve the patient experience. "We envision being able to offer different types of programming that we can't have now because we're limited in space," she says of the new adult inpatient mental health unit. "Our team has many skills that we'll be able to tap into when we get into the new place."

Along with space for group activities, the unit will have sensory tools and murals with wildlife scenery to help calm patients who are feeling agitated. As well, the opportunity to enjoy fresh air on the Huband Moffat Family Terrace "will really strengthen the therapeutic relationship between our patients and staff," Kim says.

"We want our approach to care to be part of this positive and uplifting space," she says. Kim and her colleagues look forward to implementing Safewards, a model of care for mental health units that is personalized to individual patients and helps soothe them by responding to their unique needs.

Other units that are relocating to the Thomson Centre are engaged in similar planning, says Dr. Simone, "all informed by how staff want to deliver the best possible care for our patients. We know that the hospital is a temporary home for them and we take that very seriously."

When FDC Foundation pledged to match up to \$5 million in donations, it ignited generosity. At this tipping point in our Heart of the East Campaign, people were moved to double their impact in support of our transformation.
